Visit to GBA enterprises	ILO _{1,2,3,4}	2-day-1-night off-campus visits to innovative enterprises in GBA will be arranged. Students are expected to gain a basic understanding how enterprises operate in GBA. Dialogues with the founders/representatives of the enterprises will also be arranged during the visits. Students are expected to learn from guests and examine the similarity and differences of founding and/or operating an enterprise between local and GBA settings.	9 = 13.5 EL Hours	Nil	150
Social Entrepreneurship Initiatives (SEI) (for FYFD students only)	ILO _{1,2,3,4}	Students will have opportunity to work in teams with an assigned Community Partner, i.e. social enterprise or NGO, to address specific real-world social issues. Students are expected to identify the social issues and provide innovative solutions to the assigned Community Partner, apply entrepreneurial and innovative skills in professional and authentic context, and work collaboratively with teammates and stakeholders of the Community Partner to generate and implement innovative solutions for the identified social issues.	12 = 18 EL Hours	15% to 25% of students enrolled to ELCs on E&I in each semester	200

Reflection and evaluation of activities attended	ILO _{1,2,3,4}	Students are required to complete an assessment form with a reflection at the end of each E&I activity to identify a key knowledge or skill learnt from the E&I activity and describe how it would enhance: a) their skills of analysis to identify strategies b) their innovation
Reflection and evaluation of SEI (for FYFD students only)	ILO _{1,2,3,4}	Students are required to complete an assessment form and submit a reflection report to: a) Illustrate how they analyze the issue with the most relevant information, including evaluation of evidence and logical reasoning, and describe how this process would enhance their skills of analysis to identify strategies b) Explain how they generate the project idea by exploring information from multiple perspectives, and describe how this process would enhance their innovation

5. Grading System of the 1-cp E&I Activities Organised by CEIE

Grading	Requirement

ANNEX 1: Proposed Terms of Reference for Departmental Assessment Panel (DAP) in CEIE & Membership Composition

Terms of Reference

1. To assure fair and consistent assessment of students in credit-bearing E&I activities and to examine and make a decision on any cases with irregularities.
2. To discuss and decide possible moderation of grades in credit-bearing E&I activities.
3. To monitor and review grade distribution.
4. To be responsible for the quality of assessment.
5. To endorse the assessment results of credit-bearing E&I activities for approval by University Librarian.
6. To co-opt additional members as deemed appropriate.
